## **Best Practice**

# 1. <u>Title of the Practice-</u> Survey of Out School Children in Dhule City

### 2. Goal-

The practice has following goals –

- To find out the number of out school children in the Dhule city.
- To find out the reasons behind the problem of out school children.
- To introduce students the method and manners of survey.
- To make aware the students of college the consequences of to be out school

#### 3. The Context-

The Questionnaire was prepared and it was filled by the surveyors. The interviews and oral Question and Answer were prepared by the surveyors and interacted with interviewers.

#### 4. The Practice –

"No literate society is poor and no illiterate society is than poor."

The education is the fundamental right in India conferred by the constitution. But it has not reached up to every section of the society. There are many social groups and communities which are still unprivileged of the education. If they are getting privilege of the education, they face the difficulties due to poverty, unemployment and child labor and consequently they remain out school or they do not proceed for the further education. They remain apathetic for education. The proportion of these out school children has been increasing in India. So the Government of Maharashtra aimed at to find out these children through the wide survey to bring them in to the mainstream education.

The Government of Maharashtra initiated a wide survey of the out school children in last year. The college teacher and students participated in the survey at two levels. They were motivated by the Nobel aim to contribute something into propagating education in Maharashtra and India.

Our College also participated in to these surveys and contributed as the best practice. -

1) Dhule Municipal Corporation initiated a survey on 4<sup>th</sup> July, 2015 with the help of Government of Maharashtra and our two college teachers Prof. V. K. Pawar and Dr. D. G. Vispute actively participated in to it. Dhule Municipal Corporation had appointed them as the chief observer and 120 surveyors did their survey under them and various authorities of the survey appointed by Dhule Municipal Corporation. The survey and the works

were assigned to Prof. V. K. Pawar and Dr. D. G. Vispute. They contributed actively to augment the share of institution to the government initiative and it gave positive impression for our stakeholders.

- 2) Two wards were selected for the survey and they were primarily Muslims and slum areas. They completed the survey of out school children and submitted their report to Dhule Municipal Corporation.
- 3) The Government of Maharashtra again initiated a survey of out school children on 15 to 30<sup>th</sup> January 2016 and the NSS unit and our college participated in to it. NSS Programme Officer Prof. B. D. Ganpatil and Asst. Programme Officer Dr. M. D. Gaikwad and 30 volunteers participated in to survey by visiting the localities of Jamanagiri road, Moglai, Shani Nagar, Yeshwant Nagar and Mohadi Township. They studied the reasons behind out school children. They observed that there are various reasons behind out school children. They take admission into school but they do not attend school due to their daily wages work as their parents do and the children help them.

#### 5. Evidence of Success –

The practice had a positive result. It came to know that every area has the different proportion of the out school children and some of them have the common reason behind to be out school children. The survey had submitted to Dhule Municipal Corporation.

#### 6. Problem Encountered and Reasons Reignited -

During survey, it was difficult to find out the children into different localities. The apathetic and fearing atmosphere among the residents of localities observed because they get afraid of any government survey. Even the parents didn't give authentic information about their children. Physical, infrastructural and human resources are required to tackle the problem at the institutional level for survey.
