PREFACE

It was in the year 1965 that a small group of enlightened citizens came together and formed the Vidya Wardhini Sabha. Till then, there was only one college in Dhule city. But, because of the growing population and increasing number of college - going students, the need of another college was strongly felt by all. The Sabha was formed with a view to extending higher education to the academically and socially backward classes, economically weaker section and particularly the downtrodden and tribal youths. It aimed at catering to the long felt genuine need of the students who came from different nearby villages and from the hill-side area of Satpuda. The sincere and sustained efforts of the committed and eminent persons ultimately bore the fruit and the dream of establishing a new college came into reality.

VidyaWardhini Sabha's Arts and Commerce College was started in 1966. After forty-eight years of long and sustained efforts of the dedicated members of the Sabha, the devoted members of the teaching and non-teaching staff, the sapling of this tree of education has now turns into a big Banyan tree. Now the Sabha has its Secondary School, Junior College with all the three streams and a Senior College of Arts, Commerce and Science and Post Graduate Departments in Arts and Commerce faculties.

The college is known as teachers' college. Three teachers are the members of the Governing Council as teachers' representatives. The institution has always aimed at rising and maintaining the dignity of the teacher's profession. Impetus has always been laid on the academic development of the teachers. It is a matter of great pride for us that we have 16 research guides, 17 Ph. D. holders, 09 teachers with M. Phil degrees and 18 teachers with NET / SET qualifications in the staff.

Our is the first college in Pune and then North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon to fulfill reservation quota and many teachers belonging to S.C., S.T., N.T and O.B.C. categories have proved their merit in different fields. It is really thing of great pride that when the Government of Maharashtra extended the scheme of conferring the 'Ideal Teacher Award' to the college teachers, ours was the first to get this honour. The founder Principal M. Y. Vaidya was honoured with this award. Thereafter, three more teachers from our college were the recipients of this award.

The college has excellent building infrastructure with the spacious campus of **12.7** acres with separate administrative wing, post graduate departments, laboratories, library building, separate boys' & girls' hostels, gymnasium and spacious play-ground etc.

In addition to regular courses up to postgraduate classes in Arts and Commerce faculties, our college runs a vocational course, i.e. M.A. in Mass Communication and Journalism. It is a theme of great pride to humbly note that our was first college to start this course in North Maharashtra University area in 1996. This post graduate course is still being conducted very successfully in the college. The employment rate of this course is more than 80 %. More than 30 students of this department have got job as class I and class II officers in the different offices of Government of Maharashtra. Around 250 students are working in the Print and Electronic Media successfully.

The college always provides opportunities of higher education to backward classes for their social and economic upliftment. The college has made it a point to provide facilities to the students belonging to the weaker sections of the society. Right from the beginning the numbers of enabling schemes were implemented for the benefit of needy student. For example, a scheme of "Learn and Earn" is still in practice on a small scale in the college. The other schemes like free ships, scholarships, book bank and giving cash amounts from the students' aid fund are still judiciously implemented.

One of the unique features of our college is the Central Library with rich treasure of 66,193 books. In a double storied building of the library, a reference section, study room for researcher, teachers and reading room for students are all open from 7:30am to 5:00 pm on all working days. Inter library lending membership to outsiders, open access to the concerned shelves for postgraduate and research students are some distinguishing features of the library. It is matter of pride, that we have some very valuable reference books which are rarely available elsewhere. The library has I.T. infrastructure with computers, internet service, Wi-Fi facility, downloading and printing facilities etc.

We whole heartedly feel prideful that the NAAC peer team during First cycle of Accreditation had admired our efforts but also pointed out some observations and recommendations. We tried ourselves to fulfill at some extent. Hence we have all sincerely and devotedly prepared the SSR for the second Cycle of the accreditation and looking forward the grand success.

CRITERION-WISE EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

I. Curricular Aspect -

VidyaWardhini Sabah's Arts, Commerce and Science, College has the mission 'to create excellence through qualitative education, overall personality developments and social moral awareness among the student.'... The college offers UG programmes in Arts, Commerce and science and PG Programmes in Arts, Commerce and Science. The college follows the curriculum of the affiliating university and has limited scope in designing the curriculums at UG & PG levels. Being an affiliating college it does not develop any course or programme its own.

It does also not offer any programme that facilitates twining /dual degree. It follows the credit transfer and accumulating facility and lateral and vertical mobility. The college runs self-financing programmes i. e. M. A. (Hindi, English; Mass Communication & Journalism and B.Sc.)

The curriculum is made enriched by various types of activities like Essay Writing Competition, Debate competition, Cultural programmes, Study tours, sports activities and special lectures by eminent scholars. The students of Mass Communication & Journalism and commerce have scope of employment in print as well as electronic Media and Business industries respectively. The cross-cutting issues like gender, Climate Change, Environment, Human Rights& ICT are exposed to the students.

The faculties who are appointed / elected on Board of Studies and other statutory bodies to design the curriculum take informal feedback from other faculties, students and other stakeholders. With the help of this feedback, the faculties try their best to design the curriculum which accommodates need and requirements of the time.

II. Teaching - Learning and Evaluation -

The college prospectus contains the information about admission process, the course/ programme available in the College. The admissions in to UG & PG are done as per State Government and University norms. Preferences are given to the students belonging to SC, ST, NT, & OBC. Admission into MCJ is done through Entrance Test and Personal Interviews.

The college is abided by social commitment and it concentrated over the differently abled students. So it has started the Resources Center for Differently Abled (Blind) students through which they are guided promptly to come into the mainstream education inculcating sense of oneness as the normal students. The college also sensitizes staff and students the issues of gender, inclusion and environment through the various committees like NSS, NCC, Yuvatisabha.

In the beginning of the academic year academic calendar, teaching plan & workload are prepared and communicated to the staff. The teaching Process is done in the classroom with the lecture method, seminars, group discussions, field work, uses of Audio-Visual aids, tutorials and internal examinations are held according to the syllabus & semester. The IQAC plays an important role in this process by giving the valuable suggestions. Along with this, teaching and learning process are totally students centric and critical thinking, creativity and scientific knowledge of the subjects are imparted among the students.

The recruitment process of the teachers is done as per the norms of the state government, affiliating university, U.G.C. and with the proper selection committee. The teaching staff is highly qualified of all Subjects. The staffs also are motivated to participate in Orientation Course, Refresher Course, Short Term Courses, Seminars and Conferences to update their knowledge to develop their academic quality.

The evaluation process of both teachers and students' performances are evaluated by the classroom seminars, Test & tutorials. Internal Tests of both semester and external evaluation assessed by the teachers of their respective subjects.

The student performance and learning outcomes are taken in to account on the basis of teaching and learning process. The students are motivated to take participation in various academic and cultural programmes through which their overall personality development is assessed. The personal counseling is also provided to the students to overcome their lacunas / difficulties.

III. Research, Consultancy and Extension-

The Higher education in the 21st century is research-oriented and it demands persistently to involve the faculties for the productive research to contribute the national development. The Higher education and significantly a Research are milestones in the national interest. Considering this substantiality of the research the college always motivates the faculties to adopt research potentialities.

The college has Arts, Commerce and Science streams in which the faculties have been inculcated research culture and the result of this is that **17** Ph. D holders are contributing the qualitative education in the college and **10** more have registered for the same. Our **16** faculties are research guides who are guiding **62** research scholars. The college also has one M. Phil Research Centre of Political Science, recognized by the affiliating university and **12** students have been guided. **16** Research Projects of the faculty are completed. Similarly our faculties have taken five Minor projects. One Major Research Project is under progress.

The proposals of 05 Minor and 02 Major projects have been submitted to the UGC. In order to pursue the competent research, **01 international** seminar **02** regional level seminars and **03** workshops are organized in the college and almost all the faculties have been participating and presenting their research articles in State, National and International seminars in and out of the country. The most significant & remarkable aspect of the research is that more than **40** books have been authored by our faculties.

Library makes available a productive and prosperous atmosphere for the research because there are **66,193** books, with **70** reputed magazines, Journals & periodicals. The large number of reference and resource material is available in the library through unfathomable research treasure is encountered. The faculties are contributing to the society as the social commitment by giving the free consultancy. The departments of Psychology, Geography & Commerce are imparting the knowledge as the consultancy to the needy ones on the basis of free of charge.

As the stated Objectives, Mission & Vision of the institution, social awareness & accountability are nurtured among the teaching, non-teaching staff and students and they actively participate in various social & cultural programmes. The NSS and NCC Volunteers contribute in social awareness through various programmes.

IV. Infrastructure and Learning Resources -

The college has good infrastructure and learning resources. It has a three storied building having around fifty rooms that accommodate classrooms, department's laboratories and administrative office etc. It has separate building for central library. It also has separate Boys and Girls hostels. The classrooms are spacious enough with proper ventilation and equipped with good blackboards fans and Tube lights. The managements takes overviews twice in a year for additional or modification in the infrastructure.

The principal is in continuous observation for the effective teaching and learning process and its requirements. The campus has sports grounds for football, Volleyball, Cricket, Lawn Tennis and many other outdoor games. Indoor game facility is also available for student and teacher. Well equipped Gymnasium with sufficient required instruments and machines is available.

The college has very rich library built up in the area of **5000** sq. feet with total seating capacity of **125** readers. It has around **66,193** books including encyclopedia, reference books, yearbooks, dictionaries, text books etc. It has internet facility for the faculties and computerized book issuing system. The good number of magazines & periodicals of different subjects and disciplines are prescribed for the benefit of the students, teachers and research scholars. It has a separate area for research thesis which provides a sort of guidance and help to the research aspirants. The library has I.T. infrastructure with computers, internet service, Wi-Fi facility, downloading and printing facilities etc.

The facilities available in the campus are maintained carefully with the available financial resources allocated for maintenance and upkeep of these facilities. The college has the infrastructure committee that takes stock of the facilities every year as per the need.

V. Student Support and Progression -

The college publishes its updated prospectus in the beginning of every academic year that contains information of admission Process, College fees subjects offered and rules regarding discipline and various facilities provided by the college. The enrolled students are the beneficiaries of the Government of India's scholarships and free ships. The large number of students gets the benefits of scholarships. The M. Phil. Students have also got **Rajiv Gandhi Fellowship and Minority Scholarship**. The students from the weaker sections of the society, minority's, slow learners and differently abled students have been concentrated with the priority and adequate facilities are provided to them. The guidance for various competitive examinations is provided through Vidyawardhini Competitive Examination Guidance Centre at the free of cost.

The college has both lateral and vertical mobility that observes students progression. The percentage of passed out students is remarkable and the special support is provided to the failed and proportion of drop out. The students participate in various curricular and extra-curricular activities. The large numbers of students are selected for NSS & NCC in which they participate in social and cultural awareness programme. They also are motivated to participate in inter collegiate, University, State and National level sports and cultural activities.

The interest in the creative writing among the students is promoted through the college magazine, wall magazine etc. The articles, poems and yearly write-up of college programme are published in college magazine *Vidyawardhini* and *Vrutta Vidyawardhini*, the non-periodical of journalism students respectively. The students support and

progression is maintained by the student council constituted as per the provisions made in Maharashtra University Act.

VI. Governance, Leadership and Management -

The development of any institution is possible through the inclusive and participative nature. The involvement of the all stakeholders is essential to take part in all decision making process of the institution. So, the constitution of the Institution has the provision to elect three members from the teaching staff as the representatives of the Governing Council. The other three members also are elected for Local Management Committee.

Principal governs all the academic matters with the two Vice Principals, Head of Departments and Internal Quality Assurance Cell. The various committees also are constituted that work regarding the allotted work and submit the report to the principal at the end of academic year. Principal leads the administration of the college smoothly with the help of all faculties.

The members of the management are well-known social and political personalities of the city those look after all the matters of the institution cordially and attentively. It also supports all the academic matters and pays attention to the academic development of teaching and non-teaching staff.

VII. Innovation and Best Practices -

The college has the huge campus and it is eco - friendly. The large number of tree plantation has been done and it creates a very pleasant and congenial atmosphere. The energy conservation is taken seriously and it is saved considerably because the classrooms are airy and lighted with the sunlight. Taking into consideration the carbon neutrality, all kinds of wastages are dumped into the pit rather than burning and parking allotment is aside the campus and classrooms that help to keep the premises eco-friendly.

Coping up with the innovative methods of functioning the college is practicing Biometric attendance for teachers, online admission process, ramps for the handicapped, proper disbursement of the scholarship & free ships etc. The unique and one of the significant aspect of our college is the best practice. The “Resource Center for Differently Abled” (Blind) students is contributing for the Blind students of the adjacent area who are taking education overcoming their physical barriers. The sense of oneness is inculcated among these students by letting them to participate in academic, social & cultural programmes of the college. Another best practice of the college i.e. Vidyawardhini Competitive Examination Guidance Centre is devotedly and committedly working for the tribal, backward & economically weak students by providing them competent guidance for the various competitive examinations. This centre is bringing these students in to the mainstream of the competitive world by the guidance on the free of cost and purely merit basis.

In the full-fledged globalized marketed education system of the world, our college has been concentrating over tribal & backward students who ultimately prosper their carriers through the glimpses of the knowledge provided to them by the committed minds.

The institution follows the curricular of the affiliating university i.e. North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon. On the commencement of every year, the Faculties are asked to prepare the teaching plan for the courses assigned to them. They implement the teaching plan effectively in the stipulated time under supervision of the Head of Department of respective subject. Test and tutorials are conducted to evaluate the effectiveness of implementation of curriculum. Classroom assignments are given to the student to assess their comprehensive level regarding the syllabus. They also are tested by organizing Classroom Seminar, Group Discussion on relevant topics.

The institution provides support to the Faculties in translating curriculum effectively by giving them the opportunity to participate in Orientation and Refresher Programs, so that they could improve their teaching practices. The books in the library, Journals, Periodicals, study materials and the latest updates of the respective subjects available on internet are the sources made available to the faculties to implement the teaching activity efficiently. Moreover the institution always encourages the faculties to participate actively in various Conferences, Seminars, and Workshops to improve their quality of teaching.

The institution ensures that the curriculum provided by the affiliating university is delivered effectively. Moreover, the student off mass communication and journalism are send on study tours to acquire the insights of their subject. The institution contributes in sending the post graduate students of Political Science to parliament to observe the parliamentary and democratic practices as part of their curriculum

The institution does interact with industries, research bodies and the University for an Effective Operationalization of the curriculum. Wani Marathi Research institute, Dhule which help in the operationalization of the curriculum for the post graduate students of Marathi.

The P.G. students of history visit “ Rajwade Sanshodhan Mandal” for the study of archives and numismatics etc. to know the sources of construction of history as a part of their curriculum. The faculties of the institution interact with the university by conducting the University examinations and evaluating the answer sheets as per the instructions of the controller of examination of the university. In this way the institution interacts with the industries, research bodies and the University for effective operationalization of the curriculum.

Keeping this in mind the institution plans various types of activities supplemented to the university curriculum to create excellence. Essay Writing Competitions, Debate Competition, Cultural Programs, English Speaking Programs and Study Tours for practical knowledge, sports activities, special lectures by eminent scholars of the different disciplines are some of the programs that are supplemental to integrate the curriculum of the university with the institutional goals and objectives.

- 1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?**

The institution takes the effort in enriching the curriculum to acquaint the student with the dynamic employment market. The department of Mass Communication and Journalism is a unique department of the college which provides ample

opportunities to cater the needs of the dynamic employment market in media sector. They offer internship during their study in the office of the various local newspapers and at All India Radio (Dhule).

The student of commerce are exposed to the overall management of various local industries and business establishment that brings the chances of employment for them in future. Moreover, the students are asked to be a part of Institution Placement Cell, where they are guided by experts about interview techniques & job opportunity. The central library provide separates corner for the students where the cutting of advertisement are placed of job opportunities published in different newspaper like Employment News, Times of India and the newspapers in vernaculars.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

The institution always takes effort to create the awareness among the student about the cross cutting issues likes Gender, Climate change, Environmental Education. Human Rights, ICT etc. by incorporating in the curriculum.

Gender- The institution organizes various programme under the auspices of 'Yuvati Sabha' to create the Gender awareness, women empowerment, foeticide and other issues relating to the upliftment of women socially, economically, educationally and even culturally. Moreover, the institution has dedicated its college Magazine of the year 2012-13 on the issue of foeticide.

Climate Change- The department of Geography takes efforts to guide and enlighten the students about the climate change by organizing classroom workshop. The Issues like carbon neutrality, emission of various gases causing the rise in temperature is emphatically discussed with the student to make aware about climate change. The adequate use of the domestic appliances, such as A.C. & Refrigerator which emit CFCs, is also discussed with the student. Other issues like use of vehicles are also discussed to maintain carbon neutrality.

Environmental Education- the institution ensures the environment conservation not only in and around its campus, but also in the nearby village by plantation, sanitation and building an embankment by the volunteers of NSS.

The affiliating university has included the subject Environmental Studies as compulsory subject for the student of First year of Arts, Com & Science. This also helps the student to know about environment conservation.

Human Rights- The institution is very much conscious about the issues of Human Right. The department of political science plays significant role in imparting the information about the various aspects of Human Right to the student. As the topic of Human Right is included in the university curriculum of political science the faculties of the department takes the efforts to extend the topic not only among the student of the department but the student in general.

As a matter of fact the institution as its secular temperament pave the way, for the unity in diversity among the student, on various level such as religion caste, classes, etc. The institution takes special efforts to maintain the equality among the entire student irrespective of caste, religion, classes & sex as the part of their right as being human.

ICT- Information Technology has become an integral part of the life of man. The department of the computer science of our institution takes initiatives to create the consciousness about the significance of ICT among the student of the institution. The affiliating university has also included the component regarding ICT in its syllabus of every faculty and discipline. This also helps the student to know more about the ICT and its application in day to day life so that the student should keep the pace with the time.

The institution is committed to create the values among the student as mission statement and vision statement reflect the same. For this purpose various enrichment programmes based on value education are organized for the holistic development of the students. Under the aspiration of the special lectures, the eminent scholars of different sects such as Jainism, Hinduism, Islam, Christianity are invited to preach on moral and ethical values which help to inculcate the attitude, skills since of self-reliant. It is also useful for overall personality development.

The syllabi as the important part of the curriculum are framed by the constituent bodies of the affiliating university. While preparing the syllabus these bodies take into consideration the feedback collected from the teachers of the various colleges & the experts of the respective subjects. Other parts of the curriculum e. g. Extra Coaching Classes, Spoken English Classes, Competitive Examination Guidance Centre, Personality Development workshop etc. are prepared by taking feedback from the students, faculties of the concerned department & parents to enrich the curriculum.

The institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes by conducting tests, group-discussion, mock interview etc. These are analyzed and evaluated by the experts to enrich the quality of these programmes. The institution provides the opportunities to the eligible faculties to be selected and nominated as per the norms of the affiliating university on Board of Studies, Faculties and Academic Council which are the constituent bodies to desire and develop the curriculum of the university. These faculties with the faculties of other institution design and develop the university curriculum by taking feedback from the other faculties of the concerned subjects within and without affiliating university area. The curriculum is finely approved by the academic council of the affiliating university.

The institution does not have any formal Mechanism to obtain the feedback from the students and stakeholders. However the faculties take the feedback about the curriculum and teaching methodologies randomly. If some changes are required, they are communicated to the respective board of studies by the faculties. The Board of studies also organizes workshops on syllabus framing in which the faculties and students participate and discuss the significant changes if any about the curriculum. These suggestions and recommendations are taken in to consideration in designing the curriculum.

The Science faculty which was closed due to some reasons before the first cycle of the accreditation of the institution has been restarted from June 2009 as per the recommendation of the then peer team. The science faculty has newly introduced the courses- **B. Sc.** in chemistry, Physics, Zoology, Geography and computer science.

CRITERION II: TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 Student Enrollment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The college is going to commemorate its Golden Jubilee year in 2016. Over the last 48 years the college has got an exemplary reputation as the center for excellence in higher education for the students coming from wide sections particularly SCs, STs, OBC and minority including women of the society. To grab more and more enrollment from these sections in particular and other sections in general the college has been administered its admission policy.

To ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process the college has well wide publicity programmes designed by the special committee of the faculties under the guideline of Principal. The publicity of admission process is ensured as:

- **An Advertisement**- Published in leading local and regional newspaper, with detailed information about the courses.
- **Notice Boards**- Notice Board is a means to display detail about admission process for different programs of UG and PG level. The notice boards placed in college campus with 'model application process.' Admission form, scholarship form etc. for the help of new comers and needy student
- **Prospectus**- is the only effective means of dissemination of all information containing mission of the college, intake capacity, courses offered, facilities available and campus details and application form etc.
- **Publicity** - Along with this the college also ensures the wide- publicity through bottom-line advertisement about admission on local News Channels and digital banners. The faculties, in their respective and adjacent regions, also extended their personal counseling to the student and parents.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.

The college offers not only UG degree courses in Arts, Commerce and Science but also post-graduate courses in Arts, Commerce, and Mass communication and Journalism. As far as criteria of admission for the various courses and admission process is concerned the college strictly follows the basis of admission issued by the affiliating university i.e. N. M. U. Jalgaon.

Admissions of the students to the respective courses are based on marks obtained in qualifying examination. The college has one post graduate course i.e. M. A. in Mass Communication & Journalism to which students are enrolled strictly on the basis of entrance test and personal interview. Regarding the admissions to UG and PG courses, the college, other than the affiliating university, also follows the policy of State, Central Government and U. G. C. New Delhi.

2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.

The college offers three years Under Graduate degree courses in Arts, Commerce and Science. The students seeking admission for the above courses are given admission on the “first come first serve basis”. The admission of students for various courses is made on the following basis as per the directives of NMU Jalgaon. The college as compared to the colleges within the city / district has the record of getting its commerce stream (P.G) seats filled at the earliest.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If ‘yes’ what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

The college has no any specific mechanism to review the admission process annually but has monitoring bodies which look after the trend of admission to various courses, by the students from various community especially SC & STs on the conclusion of admission process. The activities of the students are closely monitored. A record of their performance in all fields, academic or extra-curricular sport, NSS, NCC is maintained by respective committees formed in the college for every academic year. The college has observed a sharp rise in the students maintaining discipline. They have learnt to channelize their energy into more constructive activities.

2.1.5 Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase/improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate/reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion

The students enrolled for different courses in the college come from all the sections of the society mentioned above. The college makes tireless efforts to create awareness of the importance of higher education as a means of socio economic change & committedly follows the reservation policy of the government & the UGC. These students are extended fees exemption and scholarships as per the govt policy. The college facilitates needy students with hostel & library facilities and also extended the extension lectures and career counseling. Through reservation policy implementation, the college ensured access to these marginalized groups.

The women candidates (maiden girls, married and widows, deserted one, tribal) are provided equal opportunities in academic spheres. Separate hostel facilities are made available to needy women. The college with govt scholarships also provides counseling on different problems related to education, health, support, security etc. To facilitate the differently abled students the college has made well-furnished blind study center equipped with **3 computers**. These students also have provided guidance by visiting and specialized resource persons and related resource material. The students from economically weaker sections of the society also enrolled for various courses and they are helped by the faculties.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The college is fully adhering to government policies regarding the needs of differently-abled students. The region has number of disabled students who after schooling have not any avenue to continue their studies due to various reasons like lack of awareness, financially weak position, social backwardness and almost all, their inferiority complex. So keeping in this mind the college has started the Resource Centre for Differently Abled Students from 2009 and it is only the centre in the region. The specific concentration is given on these students by organizing special lectures on the syllabus, providing notes etc. The ramps are built up in the main building for the physically handicap students.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

The institution does not assess students needs formally in terms of knowledge and skills but abide by the curriculum designed by the University that provides knowledge and skill.

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge/Remedial/ Add-on/ Enrichment Courses, etc.)

The knowledge gap is bridged providing the special attention towards slow learners comparing to the other students. The special and extra lectures are organized for them to understand the subjects chosen by them. The college offers spoken English classes and guidance for various competitive examinations at free of cost through which they are coped with their programme.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The college by adhering the commitment always sensitizes its staff and student on the issues like gender inclusion, environment, women and atrocities, women empowerment, tribal developments etc. by holding seminars and special lectures. As far as gender inclusion is concerned the college celebrates 'Women's Day' and also has the days commemorate in the name of Savitri Bai Phule, the very first women Teacher in India, and has 'Yuvatisabha' to inculcate certain qualities of leadership and sense of inclusion and gender sensitization.

The college always keeps environmental issues seriously. So the tree Plantation done by the staff and the students including NSS and NCC volunteers. Due to this the campus is eco-friendly. The volunteers and cadets of NSS and NCC create awareness among the adjacent villages about the environment.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

There are various ways to detect advanced learners in the college, particularly by the teachers during their lecture in the class and by means of getting feedback from the students orally and sometimes in writing. Based on their performance students are identified as slow and advanced learners. Such learners are supported in the

best possible manner. The teacher takes extra effort in helping them with an additional and personal interest. Further such learners are motivated for higher seats of learning and topmost Career options by the college committee on competitive Exams and Career counseling and placement. Motivational and guidance lecture are also arranged by the college to channelize their potential to accomplish better success.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

As mentioned above an academic preference of the students from the disadvantaged section of the society, physically challenged, slow learners economically weaker section etc. are detected by the teachers during their classroom lectures, and also by the marks they obtained in the qualifying examination. On the basis of these slow learners students are concentrated. The morale of the slow learners is boosted by special interactive discussion and remedial guidelines in the classroom. They are also advised and motivated by providing additional learning tips and books with analysis of previous years question papers of the examinations and the effect is made to control drop-out.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

Before the beginning of the semester of every academic year, the academic calendar is released by the affiliating university, which enshrined with working and holidays, and is to be followed by the college. Each department design teaching plan at department levels and function accordingly. Head of the respective departments discuss the syllabus term wise with other faculties of the department. The faculties prepare and distribute the course work among them. The faculty follows a lesson plan which contains respective topic and the time to be concluded. Time table are another means which help to follow the teaching plan. It is binding to every faculty to adhere this time table for whole academic year. The department as per the directions / plan of the affiliating university carries out internal assessment on students internal test performance, punctuality and their classroom behavior. The final evaluation of students is done according to the affiliating university schedule. Towards the end of even semester, theory and practical, oral / viva-voce examination are conducted under the university direction and evaluation is carried out at college level assessment camp (in certain respect) at centralized level in the university's CAP. The results of the examination are declared and statements of marks are issued by the affiliating university.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

The college has its Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) which plays a vital role in the assessment of quality in the college.

Qualitative development of any college is not measured only on academic basis but administrative basis too. IQAC provides parameters for both academic as well as administrative development. It gives suggestions about seminars, conferences and symposium, to organize by the college, because such events provides space be of

interaction between different scholars, college faculties & students. It also prepares feedback form for teaching and learning process to be filed by the students and teachers.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

The college offers a lot of support services to its faculties for making the learning student. The college provides a well-stocked library enriched with latest books & journals which the faculty uses efficiently to provide latest information, to the students. Students are also encouraged to use library independently as it helps to update their knowledge. To inculcate the sense of interactive & collaborative learning, the college makes suggestion to Head of Department & faculties about seminars, workshops, debates on departmental level. The college also encourages the use of internet and computers by the staff and students to keep them abreast of the latest developments in their respective field of study. The teacher also is encouraged to participate in Seminars, Conferences, Orientation and Refresher courses.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

To engineer the society it is necessary to have citizens with progressive thinking. Because the society based on inequality has been remaining as matter of concerns for longer time in India. Education is the only way to eradicate the sense of inequality and related concerns. The college wants to be democratic family having formidable space of critical thinking, creativity, scientific temper and above all expression of all kind. To inculcate the sense of critical thinking in the students they are encouraged to have group discussions on various issues (regional, national, international) that occupy special space in media. Every year the college organize state level debate contest on burning issues which also helps to the student to develop the sense of critical thinking.

The college also provides to students space for creativity particularly to girl students by arranging rangoli contest, saari day and encouraging them to contribute to the College Magazine. Scientific temper is the only way to create modern society free of all dogmas and stigmas accordingly the faculty engages the students in various practical works on science in labs of various subjects like physics, chemistry, botany, zoology, psychology, geography & computer science.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

To make teaching learning process interesting and effective in addition to the traditional teaching methods and aids faculties use modern multimedia teaching aids like Audio-Visual aids, Laptop and mobile in the classroom teaching. The students are encouraged to use their cell phone as a device that help to acquire knowledge.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

The students are exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skill by following way.

- The colleges arrange lectures of renowned personalities and chance made available to interact with them.
- All the students are made compulsory to attend such lectures.
- The Principal of the college kindly suggest to all the HODs about the seminars and workshop on the academic topics at departmental level to be conducted in the respective departments.
- The college subscribes various standard journals, magazines of all subjects to enrich the students with the knowledge & information.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students \benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advise) provided to students?

The college has been actively extending academic, personal psycho-social support and professional counseling to the students.

1. **Professional Counseling** - The College has particular committees namely Career Counseling and Placement Committee & Competitive Exam. Guidance Centre and they provide the detail information to look after such affairs of the needy aspirant students.
2. **The academic** –The college teachers always provide useful tips to maintain students' academic good. As a part of it the teacher carefully monitor the regularity of attendance, participation in classroom workshops, other curricular activities & the performance of the students in internal test & semester exams. As per the need the students, they are advised to improve by their academic records.
3. **Personal** –The college faculty regularly provide their righteous help in all respects wiz financial, academic, personal and above all morals as these are very important factors that affects student's personality.
4. **Psycho-social support** –The students who seek psycho-sociological boosting or the students who are psycho-socially left out are given psychological counseling by the college faculty, especially by the psychology department.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

The innovative teaching Methods are not adopted specifically but whatever methods are employed are effective. But the teaching staff adopt methods like seminars, conferences and special lectures. The college on its part encourage the faculties to participate in such national / international conferences seminars, workshops by providing them financial assistance as per the rule of the UGC / affiliated University.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching- learning process?

It is rightly said that ‘The library is the soul & mind of the college.’ Our college also has well nurtured and well-furnished centralized library with **66193** books (with reference books) and near about **70** Journals of various categories (Magazines, fortnightly & weekly). The college places such a huge well catalogued library resources at the service of society through the main users i.e. teachers & students & researchers.

With the help of wide range of reference books & resources, the teachers update their knowledge to impart is to the students. The library has spacious reading hall for both students and teachers and it is used optimally.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If ‘yes’, elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

As a as completion of the curriculum is concerned the institution faces some probable challenges like.

- Inadequate time as compared to the syllabus & semester pattern prescribed by affiliating university.
- Holidays.
- Various cultural programme organized in the college.
- In spite of all these challenges the college teachers manage to deliver their responsibilities by arranging extra lectures, during and after college hours and even during holidays.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

Lectures are personally inspected by the principal and vice principal through regular visits to the classrooms. The office of the college maintains movement register for monitoring available time and resources of the faculties for academic works. Internal examinations random interaction of students & teachers feedback from the students and the IQAC’s regular feedback to the teachers about teaching & learning process help to monitor & evaluates the quality of teaching & learning.

2.4 Teacher Quality

The recruitment of the teaching faculty is purely by the norms and guidance of the state Government and UGC. The qualified staff is recruited by the proper selection committee appointed by university. The eligible and competent candidates are given preference those tackle the challenges and changing requirement of the curriculum. Along with this, the C.H.B. faculties also are appointed abiding by the rules and guidelines of the university. Then eligible candidates are informed with date of the interview. A panel of experts to conduct the interview.

- 2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/ scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/ modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

At the beginning the college has only Arts and Commerce degree programs. But in the year 1996 the college started science programs on Non Grant basis. But meanwhile due to certain constraints it has been abandoned. During first cycle of NAAC the peer team had pointed out this vacuum and suggested to the college to restart the science programme. Hence the college, in the wake of fulfillment of the vacuum started science programme on Non Grant basis with the subjects Chemistry, Physics, Zoology & Geography.

• **Teaching learning methods/approaches -**

Except conventional lecture method with conventional teaching aids like black board the college has not have any computer aided teaching & leaning methods. Due to inadequate financial resources the college could not made avail improved computer teaching / learning aids. Our science wings which are permanently on non grant basis has computer lab for the related programme only.

• **Handling new curriculum -**

The college has a lot of experienced & qualified faculties to handle the new curriculum with ease. Our faculty members are members of board of studies of N. M. U. Jalgaon. They lead actively in designing the framework of new curriculum. Whenever there is a change in the curriculum initiated by University the same is converged to the HODs by the principal time to time on this the HODs call meetings of their co staff members and explain the new curriculum with strategies to tackle new curriculum.

• **Assessment -**

Assessment is an important and inevitable activity in the field of education, as it gives a picture of achievements and needs of the faculty in terms of their research and other related activities in particular and other extra activities in general. As far as faculty is concerned the self-assessment report is one of the important parameters used for the promotion of the faculty. For the purpose the college has taken into account the self-assessment report of all the faculties and made suggestions to improve it. Apart from the self-assessment report the principal maintains the academic confidential report (ACR).

• **Cross cutting issues -**

The college has an ample space for the cross cutting issues like gender, environment, education, women protection, women empowered, superstitions foeticide etc. The management also has supports for such social causes. As a part of women empowerment the college offers hostel facilities at normal rate, various scholarships from government, free medical and psychological aids and advice. The colleges also firmly stand for the issue like environment protections as it has been organized plantation of saplings in the campus and in the targeted area with the assistance of NSS. Many of our faculty members have delivers lectures on the topic related to environment protection.

The institution also arranges special lectures to enrich the faculties & students with new ideas & thoughts. The institute has conducted one international conference on Hindi with inter disciplinary approach. The institute also grants leaves to those who wish to participate in certain academic & research work. With the constitution of research projects committee the institution encourages the faculties to engage themselves in the research works in their respective field for that the said committee provides detail information related proposals.

The institution encourages faculties to prove their mettle. For the purpose the institution provides necessary support with essential infrastructure and conducive atmosphere with full of freedom. 2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

In academic scenario the process of evaluation is very important as it is directly related to improve the quality of the persons / professionals concerned. As one of the qualitative measures evaluation is an essential thing in the archeological process of knowledge i.e. teaching learning process. In the wake of the process, institutions gets the evaluation of the teachers on student basis & external peer's basis.

- ❖ **Student basis** – Suggestion box is an important tool that has been used by the institute to evaluate the teachers. The institute placed suggestion box by the way of which the students can write their complaints suggestions with or without mentioning their names. Whatever inbox feedback from the students is open in the presence of the Principal & Vice Principal are analyzed and communicated to the teachers related for the betterment of the teaching and learning process. Principal & Vice Principal also go to the regular visits, round during college hours. By the way they also meet the students outside and interact with them.
- ❖ **Peers basis** – I.Q.A.C. is an important peer for the institution as it provides parameters to create & maintain quality of academic affairs like teaching and learning process in the institution. To make teachers evaluations effective IQAC provides special feedback proforma having questionnaire directly related to the teachers knowledge subject command, language, fluency, presentation etc. By distributing among and filling the feedback proforma by the students the IQAC collects it from the students and present before the Principal & Vice Principal to undertake necessary action. On this the Principal communicates the remarks made by the students to the related teacher for the purpose of improvement.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The evaluation is an integral part of teaching learning process. Every institution have to ensure that the stakeholders of the institution particularly students and faculty and the parents generally. Our institute has been ensured its stakeholders i.e. students and faculty about evaluation process in following ways -

- **Staff Meetings** – The institute in the very beginning of the academic year and commencement of the respective programs conduct staff meeting to discuss about the changes like pattern of examination (80 + 20 , 60 + 40, annual, semester etc) and evaluation parameters, nature of question paper made by the affiliating university i.e. N M University Jalgaon about the evaluation process.
- **Classroom instruction & students notice board** – The students are informed about the evaluation process. The students are made aware with the syllabus of the respective programme & its relevance in the present centers, pattern of examination, types of question to asked marks, allotment etc. The same also displayed on the students notice board

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The North Maharashtra University Jalgaon has introduced certain evaluation reforms during the period of reaccreditation which has been considered as major and they are -

1. Semester pattern of examination
2. Codification of secret code numbers to make the process of evaluation more transparent.
3. Introduction of OMR answer sheets (for objective test)

4. The internal assessment (CA) and the University assessment (U.A)
5. Weightage for students' behavior, regularity in the classroom and time to time assignments.
6. Practical exams (especially for science subjects)
7. Viva voice, project/ practical report for science programs & some P.G. courses like English and MA Mass Communication.

In spite of little scope for the institution to introduce its own evaluation reforms the institution on its own, has initiated some steps to tackle the affair of evaluation & to make it more transparent has adopted. Verbal evaluation of the students by the way of speech, seminars, group discussion on topics of academic and non-academic importance is done.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The evaluation reforms of the affiliating university has two levels of assessment / evaluation namely –

1. The internal assessment and evaluation (CA) –

The internal assessment and evaluation is conducted at college. The institution for that has examination committee with one of the faculties as its head and others as members with responsibility to conduct examinations as per the direction & time to time instructions issued by the N. M. University Jalgaon. The said committee checkout the detailed programme of arrangement of internal examination within stipulated time, before each semester exam.

2. The university evaluation & assessment (U.A) –

The College has whole responsibility to conduct all the university examinations under the guidelines of the affiliating university. For the effective implementation the college appoints faculties as the junior supervisors & supporting staff, available for every session. As for as the assessment is concerned the institution make arrangement of special duty leave to these who called by the university for Central Assessment Programme. (CAP)

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adapted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

To measure student's achievement the institution adopt both formative and summative assessment approaches. Under formative approach of assessment the institution adopted internal assessment test (at the end of each semester), verbal question-answer in the classroom, and time to time assignment, group-discussion among the student, student-teacher interaction and seminars on the topics having in academic importance. These opportunities give lot of information about student achievement after teaching. Summative approach as assessment is nothing but the end of every semester. It is carried out by N. M. University Jalgaon. To perform well at summative level, the faculty arranged special lecture, for the students.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.

The internal assessment is one of the important indicators of students academic performance in which the institution has to maintain complete transparency. Our institution adopted the criteria of evaluation, as directed by the University. Accordingly all the students are made acquainted with the process of internal assessment/ test. By displaying necessary information on student notice boards and also by class wise circulation of notice about internal test, weightage of Marks. The faculty member undertake the affair of internal assessment with keeping in mind the various aspects like-class attendance, time to time class assignment class-behavior, independent learning efforts, communication skill of the students of the respective course/ programmes.

2.5.7 What are the mechanism for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

The institution has been followed two evaluations process, as per the direction of the affiliating university. One at the institution level and other at the university level. An evaluations at the institutional level is called college assessment (CA) and that at university level is called university assessment (UA). Whenever the students having grievance or doubt with reference to evaluation at institutional level, the institution under the guidance of examination committee, head of the respective departments and the faculties related made it clear by showing students performance in the written test along with their attendance classroom behavior & assignment, sincerity about works etc. the institution has provision for re-examination. The doubt regarding University examination they are guided to go as per procedures of filling the forms of Reassessment.

2.6. Student performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes' give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

Yes, the college has clearly stated learning out comes. The college strictly follows academic curriculum well designed, with specific knowledge, values and skills, by N. M. U. Jalgaon. It is necessary for the college to make aware both the faculty and students with the learning outcomes prescribed by the affiliating university. For the purpose the college through Heads of the all departments and its faculties extended the awareness of these learning out comes of the particular curriculum to the students. Dissemination of information about learning outcomes to the students and faculty is very important for the college to evaluate the effectiveness of academic programmes and concerned activities.

2.6.2 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? Provide an analysis of the students results/achievements (Programme/course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.

The institution is affiliated to North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon which prescribed semester pattern of courses and evaluation. So, it is compulsory for the institution to monitor the completion of syllabus within stipulated time. Because incompleteness of the syllabus, as we thought may affect students' academic performance. To avoid this, institution has been constituted the time table committee assigned with the task of program wise time table on equitable basis. The institution with the help of HODs chalked out semester wise teaching and evaluation plan. The HODs with their colleagues try to implement the teaching plan as well as the curricular like tutorials assignments etc. As far as monitoring of evaluation performance and progress of the students is concerned the institution through its faculties strictly implement various activities prescribed by the affiliating university. That includes project work, regular attendance, classroom assignments, classroom & campus behavior. The examination committee looks after all matter of examination. Besides examination committee the institution also has other committees like state level debate competition committee, competitive exams guidance committee, magazine committee, literary association, sports committee NCC, NSS Art circle etc., to monitor the students' progress and performance other than academic one. The students who performed well have been rewarded on the annual day function.

2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

The institution has tried well to create well-structured teaching learning and assessment strategies to facilitate the achievement of intended learning outcomes. For the purpose, the institution has tried to create a supportive, vibrant and challenging learning environment. The principal, the staff and students are the basic units in this learning environment. All these units on their parts are remained active in the creation of learning environment. The principal, with the help of staff, involved in the construction of well nurtured strategies of teaching, learning and assessment in which all the students are equally valued. Through various academic committees, under the academic leadership, the institution tries to enhance the quality of teaching learning and assessment across the institute. As far as teaching is concerned, the institution under the principal, provides support & freedom to the faculty to adopt various teaching methods and aids to write, attend and present or publish their research paper & books, to nominate the faculty for orientation refresher and various short term course. The institution also provides the students various platforms to prove and improve their potential in both curricular and extracurricular activities. All these platforms help the students to enhance their potential of personality development and lifelong learning. The institution also follows cordial supportive but transparent assessment protocol. Which are student centric & provided with optimum flexibility as it necessary to avail possible chances space to prove students learning potentials and make them learning prone.

2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude? developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

The placement Unit is established in the college that organizes placement camps of various banks or companies. The students also are motivated to adopt research aptitude by guiding them or sending to the seminars/ conferences. The M. Com and Mass Communication students prepare their dissertation and reports that has social and economic relevance.

2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

Classroom seminars, oral question, answer on the topic taught, classroom assignments, practical, class attendance and internal test at the end of each semester are the events that arranged by the institute to evaluate the students learning out comes. The examination committee with the help of the respective faculty collects and analyze data & sends it to the University for final assessment.

For effective learning outcomes and to overcome learning barriers the institute has taken following steps -

- Seminars on Model answer writing
- Extra lectures and personal counseling to slow learners.
- Special efforts for personality development of the students coming from Tribal regions.
- Minimum attendance limit for students to minimize classroom absentee.

2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

To monitor and ensure the achievement of learning out comes the institution has clear and transparent assessment practice college level in which -

- Attendance is compulsory for every lecture
- Group discussion class assignments laboratory works are regularly arranged in each semester.
- Student's classroom behavior and participation in extracurricular activities.

Transparent assessment of all activities performed by the students are important on the basis of students performance in the above mentioned activities. The respective faculty judge the student level and suggest necessary steps to be taken for improvement. At the end of each semester students achievements are communicated to committee & office for further action. Special and personal counseling is given to slow learners with cordiality.

By participation performance of the students in various curricular and extra-curricular activities the college ensures the attainment of the graduate attributes.

2.6.7 Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/ evaluation outcomes as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

The institution and individual teachers use assessment and evaluation as an important indicator for evaluating student's academic performance. But students active participation in various extra-curricular activities like sports, cultural programme, N.S.S., N.C.C., classroom behaviors sincerity of works and social attitude are also indicators that has been considered important to measure students overall personal development both academically and individually.

CRITERION-III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

3.1 Promotion of Research

3.1.1 Does the institution have recognized research center/s of the affiliating University or any other agency/organization?

Yes, the institution has M. Phil Research Centre for the Political Science recognized by NMU Jalgaon from 2008 13 students were admitted and out of them 12 are awarded.

3.1.2 Does the Institution have a research committee to monitor and address the issues of research? If so, what is its composition? Mention a few recommendations made by the committee for implementation and their impact.

The institution has not constituted specific research committee. The Principal, IQAC & UGC schemes committee always encourage the faculties and students to adopt research potentialities.

3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/ projects?

The Institution and Principal provide a favorable atmosphere to involve with the qualitative research. The faculties of different departments have completed Minor Research Projects, M. Phil and Ph. Ds. The principal Investigators have full autonomy to engage with ongoing research projects. The institution has the huge infrastructure and library with various research and reference sections and the researchers always have open access. The researchers mostly do their research work other than teaching time. The college sanctions special leave for the investigators. All the support of technology and information needs is always available. The auditing of expenditure and preparation of utilization certificate of sanctioned and spent amounts for the projects is on time & up to date.

5.3.3 How does the college seek and use data and feedback from its graduates and employers, to improve the performance and quality of the institutional provisions?

The institution takes the feedback from the graduates to improve the performance and quality of institution. The Principal calls common meeting of the graduates and the staff discussed enhancement and improvement of the performance & quality of the institutional provisions. The measures are taken to implement the outcome of discussion.

5.3.4 How does the college involve and encourage students to publish materials like catalogues, wall magazines, college magazine, and other material? List the publications/ materials brought out by the students during the previous four academic sessions.

Department wise students encouraged & guided from every faculty to prepare articles, wall magazines & are given wide publicity. Some of them are published in college magazine also. The students are encouraged to write articles & make the posters on the burning issues of the society. These articles & posters are displayed on the wall magazine situated in the central library; these are open for students of the college & visitors to the library. Likewise the student also write various articles, stories, poems which are published in the annual college magazine 'VidyaWardhini'.

The college magazine is published every year, as special number on the current issues like Tsunami, riots, female foeticide, women empowerment, global warming & eradication of superstitions etc. The MA Mass Communication department publishes "Vrittavidyawardhini", which is non-periodical. In it also the students of the department publish their articles, features, news items and development news. It is edited by students of MA Mass Communication.

5.3.5 Does the college have a Student Council or any similar body? Give details on its selection, constitution, activities and funding.

Yes, the College has the Student's Council. It is formed as per the norms & guidelines given by North Maharashtra University. The members of student council are representatives of their respective class / Faculty.

It is constituted every year as per the provisions made in Maharashtra University Act 1994, section 40(2) (b) (v). There are 24 members in the student council out of which Principal is Chairperson; one teacher nominated by principal, Associate NCC Officer, NSS programme officer, Director of Physical Education and 13 members are selected on merit basis from each class. Out of remaining six members are representatives of different extra-curricular activities like Sport, NSS, NCC, and Cultural Events. Two girls are nominated in student council as girl representatives. The student council is one of the most important bodies possible for smooth function and governance of college from the point of view of students.

These student- members need to have following qualifications:-

To be academically topping in the class/course, to pass the previous courses without ATKT, to bear good character, to bear the best academic record, topper in the activity to represent etc.

The council of the students performs following activities: -

To take care of college events like admissions, enrollment, co-curricular activities, classes, time-table, office cooperation to students, smooth working of the college, injustice done to students, and the like matters. It plays a significant role in gatherings, cultural events, and a university level -Yuvarang. It is a mediator between the Principal and the students. To solve the problems of students related to higher education, academic, office, library, water, internet, ground, sports, admissions, examinations, gathering, vacation, deputation of students, competition, participation and etc. The meetings of council are regularly held the outcomes of which are properly implemented.

The college has an interaction with the Alumni Association through which discussion and suggestions are taken into account. Institution and faculty members try to be in contact with our Alumina and arranges meeting to share their ideas for the improvement of the institution. We also take the advice of the retired teaching faculties & non-teaching staff. Some of the retired faculties serve the institution as visiting faculty.

CRITERION-VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 State the vision and mission of the Institution and enumerate on how the mission statement defines the institution's distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the needs of the society, the students it seeks to serve, institution's traditions and value orientations, vision for the future, etc.?

The Mission of the institution ensures the distinctive characteristics to create excellence through qualitative education providing the students to cater to the needs of emerging era. A throughout concentration is given to the overall development of their personality and inculcate among them moral and social values and awareness so that they could prove themselves responsible progressive citizens of the nation. The institution has a tradition of the commitments to abide by the constitution to uplift the students from the weaker section of society, tribal, minorities, women etc. The vision for the future is to create competencies among students to tackle the various crisis in personal and social life.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

To design and implement the quality policy of the institution various bodies formed by the top management. The Governing council of the sabha, the local management committee, Principal, Vice Principal and Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) together discuss and deliberate the issues of the enhancement of quality policy. The Principal calls the meeting twice a year of the faculties including IQAC. The Policy and Plans about the quality education are conveyed to all faculties Finalized by the management and the principal and they are asked to implement.

6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring:

The Vidyawardhini Sabha has the provision in its by – laws to elect three faculty member on its Governing Council. In addition to this, other three faculty members are appointed on the local management committee of the college. The managerial leadership frames, constitutes the Policies and guidelines about all academic matters taking into consideration the mission statements of the institution. These policies are conveyed to the faculties to implement in teaching – learning process and day – to – day administration.

- **Formulation of action-**

The Principal, Vice Principals formulate the action plan with consultation of the respective head of the departments. These plans are followed by the faculties. The approved action plans are observed by the management whether they are in accordance with mission and strategic policies of the institution. At operational level the institution has flexibility to incorporate various innovative and practical ideas.

- **Interaction with Stakeholders-**

The institutional leadership always involves in the matter of interaction with the Stake holders. The institution interact with Stake holders by taking feedback from students, meeting of parent – teachers. It also interacts with the society through the extension activities.

- **Proper Support for Policy-**

Time –to- time interaction takes place between the management and the stake holders about the framing of academic policy and plans. Needs of the stake holders are gained by interaction and feedback system. Those needs are researched and analyzed and then recommended to the management. In accordance with this the management Frames academic policies and plans and they are implemented by the institution.

- **Reinforcing the Culture of excellence-**

The leadership always strives for achieving the excellence on academic and social levels. The institution organizes various academic programs by inviting an eminent scholars and academicians to enlighten the students. The faculties always motivate the students for the quest of excellence through different cultural activities. The students also are encouraged to extend their skills to serve in the society through the activities of NSS, NCC and others.

- **Champion organizational Change-**

The Management always welcomes the good changes on the organizational level. It always takes into consideration the suggestion and recommendation regarding innovative changes of the faculty and other stakeholders for the smooth functioning of the institution.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The policies & plans framed by the management are implemented under the guidance of the Principal. In the beginning of every academic year, the principal forms various committees. Consisting of one chairman and other 3 members in each committee. In the meeting of all committee members, the Principal conveys the policies and plans of the institution and how they could be effectively implemented through the channels of these committees. These are engaged throughout the year in different activities aiming at to create the excellence among the students. At the end of the year report of the activities of all committees are

collected for the matter of evaluation. While evaluating the Principal and the committee members recommend the suggestions for further improvement.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The Concept of the top management follows decentralized academic leadership in which the principal plays a pivotal role. The principal as the head of the institution who looks after all the academic affairs by assigning academic activities to head of the departments with the members and they look after their departmental academic activities. The Heads of the departments assign academic responsibilities to his colleagues & he himself leads his department in academic matters.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The College encourages the leadership at various levels. At the primary level, College constitutes student council as per the norms of affiliating university. The topper of each class and the representatives of various curricular and extracurricular committees like Cultural, NSS, NCC, Sports, etc. comprise the student council which leads the student's fraternity. Each topper of the class leads his class. The representatives of the student council elect one of them as leader who is known as University Representative (U.R.) and he represents the college at university. The college also provides sufficient space to each faculty to lead the class in particular and the students in general. The heads of the departments leads the faculty members of his department.

The college also forms various committees that deal with curricular & extracurricular activities. The chairman of each committee leads his committee member to implement the activities of the respective committees.

The office superintendent leads the day – today official works of the college administration. The vice- principals supervise all these activities under the leadership of the principal.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

The college follows the decentralized system of governance and it offers operational autonomy to the each head of the departments to look after the departmental affairs. Likewise the Office Superintend also has the operational autonomy in the official work. (The details of the decentralized governance systems are mentioned in 6.1.5 & 6.1.6 of this criterion.)

6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

Yes, since the inception of the college, it promotes the cultural of participative management. Three members of the top management are elected from the faculties. Besides, three faculty members are appointed on local management committee. The Principal himself is the crucial part of the management and is as (ex-office) **Joint Secretary** in the college governance.

Each regular faculty member has the right to become a life member of the management council (i.e. **VidyaWardhini Sabha**) Along with this, the college promotes a culture of participatory management by involving the Vice- Principals,

Heads of the departments, Chairmen of each committee and non- teaching staff for the smooth functioning of the academic management.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

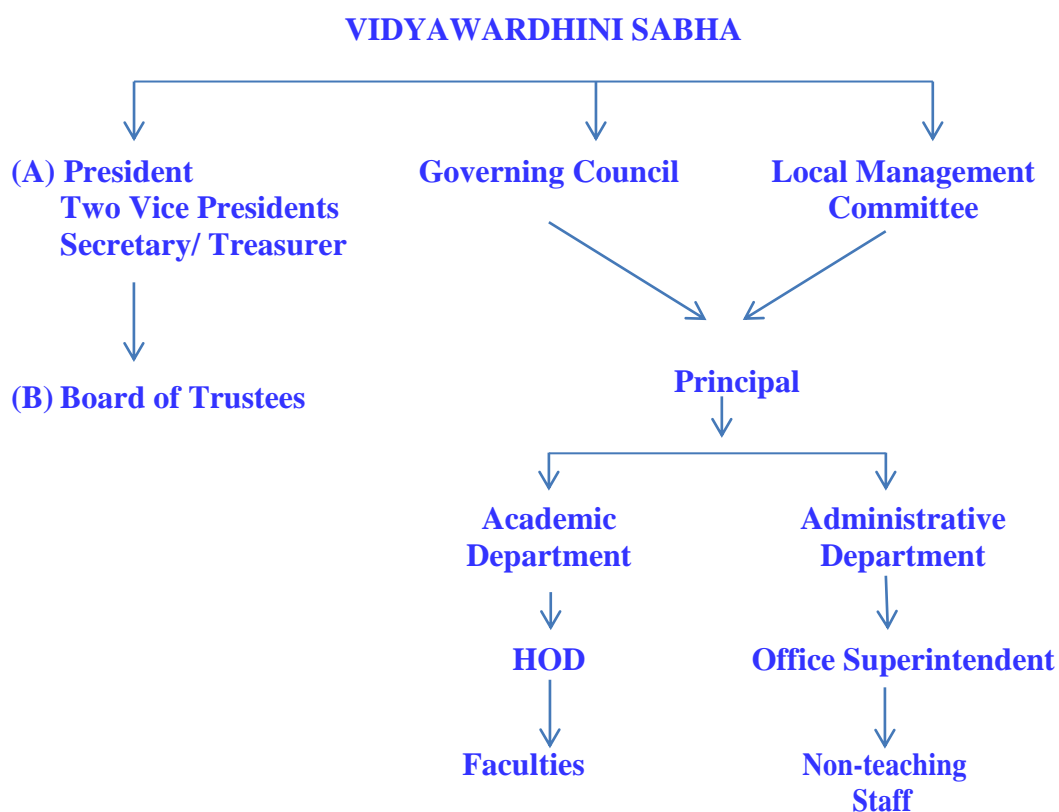
6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

Yes, the quality policies of the institution rely on the vision, mission and objectives. The quality policies framed by the institution are communicated to all stakeholders through the meetings of the student council and staff members under the leadership of the principal. The mission, vision and objectives are displayed at the prominent places in the college. The institution ensures the deployment of the institutional policies through various means like faculties and committees formed by the principal. The policies are reviewed from time-to-time to achieve the qualitative goals of the institution.

Yes, the institution has the perspective plan.

The Governing Council is the decision making body. The decisions taken by GC are implemented under the leadership of principal with the help of Vice Principals, HODS and OS & his assistance.

6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following

- **Teaching & Learning**

The teaching learning process of the institution is practiced effectively. The institution has two level quality improvement strategy as per as teaching and learning is concerned.

Each faculty member prepares his teaching plan of the courses assigned to them by the H O Ds. The faculty collects the resources and study material from the books, internet, e-books etc. The faculties use various teaching methods.

The faculty members are sent for orientation, refresher, short term courses, seminar, conferences, workshops etc. organized by the universities and other institutions to upgrade and enrich themselves for effective teaching.

- **Research & Development**

The institution encourages all the faculty members to participate in various research activities like M.Phil., Ph.D., Minor & Major Research projects, writing research articles, publishing books etc. As a result 50 % of our faculties are awarded Ph.D. degree, some of them are completed research projects, authored & edited books, wrote research articles & chapters in the journals and book etc.

The students of MA. Mass Communication and M.Com are assigned research projects & surveys as part of their syllabus. The university also assigns survey to the college student. The college has M.Phil research centre in the subject of political science.

- **Community engagement**

The Faculties and students are engaged with the community service under the banner of NSS & NCC activities like tree plantation, Blood donation, Nala Bunding, Community sanitation, literacy mission and social awareness programs etc.

- **Human resource management**

Under the leadership of the principal the teaching & non-teaching staff always extends their efforts & take pains to improve the quality of the institution. The faculties are sent to various conferences, seminars, workshops, orientation & refresher programs to update their knowledge and to improve teaching quality. The non – teaching staff also guided by the principal & senior faculty members particularly the teachers from commerce wing to improve the quality of office management and day to day administration. The most important resources are the students of the college. The principal and all the faculty members are always in the pursuit of improving the learning quality of the students so that they will be able to compete at national level and offer their contribution in the development of the nation.

- **Industry interaction**

The institution interacts with the industries located in and around Dhule city by signing MOUs and offering consultancies in the areas of commerce, account & Tax consultation. The institution has a unique practice of offering consultancy and services to the industries in exchange of employment for the students.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The head of the institution communicates to the top management the information about the institution which he gets from the feedback and personal contacts. The information is made available to the management in the meeting of the governing council of the institution. He conveys the meeting of the faculties and non-teaching to provide the adequate information about the institution. He also discusses the important matters about the institution with the office bearers of the G.C.if required.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

The management and the principal always encourage and support the involvement of staff in improving effectiveness and efficiency of institutional process, such as admission process, Teaching learning, examination, research activities, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities and other day-to-day administrative process by providing guidance and valuable suggestions with the Principal, Vice Principals, teacher representatives on Governing Council of the management. The management also takes care of the smooth running of the institution through effective and efficient institutional processes.

6.2.7 Enumerate the resolutions made by the Management Council in the last year and the status of implementation of such resolutions.

Yes the affiliating university has provision for the status of autonomy to the affiliated institutions. But our institution has not made the efforts in obtaining autonomy.

The institution has grievance redressed cell for students. Complaint Box are placed at many places in the campus. The students are asked to mention their complaints about academic and administrative matters. If the complaints received, they are redressed by the cell in its meeting under the guidance of principal. The grievances of the staff are also resolved by the G.C and principal. By redressing the grievances at every level helps to establish better and healthy relationship between the institution & stakeholders.

6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?

Fortunately, no any case has been filed by and against the institution in last four years.

6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

The principal calls the meeting of the students council to take the feedback from members of student council regarding the performance of the institution. Suggestions and recommendations of the student council are taken in to consideration while framing the policy of institution for quality and excellence of institutional performance.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff?

Efforts are made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff by sending them for orientation, refresher, short term courses, training session for non-teaching staff which help to upgrade their knowledge in their respective areas. In addition to this the teaching staff also participates in the conferences, seminars, workshops, symposia for their professional developments.

The institution makes the books journals, study material, EBooks, Research articles from internet etc available for the teaching staff so that they can improve teaching qualities with the latest trends in their respective subjects. The institution also motivates the teachers to undertake research projects and research activities for the sake of quality enhancement and excellence in teaching. The non-teaching staff are sent to the training organized by the MKCL and university.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The institution always takes into consideration the development and empowerment of the faculty by sanctioning their leaves through which they attend some faculty development courses and programs. Along with this the institution provides the moral support to faculty for solution of academic and administrative problems.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

Every Teacher is asked to fill up the particular Performance of his/her appraisal report. These reports with the remarks and Sign of the head of the respective departments are submitted to the principal. The principal goes through these reports to evaluate the academic curricular extra-curricular and extension activities of the teacher. The principal on his part makes suggestion for the better performance of the teacher. The principal's appraisal report is evaluated by the top management to suggest him for the better performance.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The deficiencies of any teacher if found or evaluated, the principal make him / her aware of the points of matter of concerns regarding their performance in writing. He also suggests the remedies to overcome the deficiencies of the concerned teacher; these things are appropriately communicated to the stakeholders.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

The teaching and the non-teaching staff are entitled various types of welfare schemes extended by the government and made available to the staff by the institution these welfare schemes are

- Provident – Fund
- Group Insurance
- Various leaves like- medical leave, maternity leave, study leave Earn leave and Lien facility
- Claim of Medical Bills
- VWS Employees Credit society's Mritunjay scheme.

All the staff Member of the institution enjoying these welfare schemes.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

Whenever there is a vacant post / posts of any faculty, it is well advertised in the local and national newspapers as per the norms of the affiliating university i:e NMU, Jalgaon the state Government and UGC, to call for the application for the same within stipulated time. On the receipts of application the eligible and well qualified candidates are called to present themselves before the interview panel constituted by the affiliating university as per its norms. The institute make every attempt to get the well qualified and efficient candidate selected. This recruitment process is maintained fairly and transparent.

The institution takes every measure to retain the eminent faculties by providing them the facilities to enhance their academic quality. The institution remained very supportive as they are provided the facilities like- participating and organizing national and international seminars, conferences, workshops etc. The qualified faculties are elected and appointed on the various bodies of the affiliating university like Board of studies (BOS), academic council, and senate and management council with the cordial support of the institution.

Three senior eminent faculties are elected on the governing council of the management as per provision in the societies by laws. By this they directly became the part of decision making body of the institution. The institution also extended all the welfare schemes to all the faculties.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The major financial resources of the institution are the various types of grants from the, UGC. The government scholarship, the fees received from the student and the donations given by the prominent person of the society. These financial resources are used efficiently and effectively by the institution through a proper Mechanism. Whenever such grants are received for any particular purpose, the institution forms a committee and this committee, with the prior sanctions of the Management, deals the matters of expenditure. The committee takes proper precautions to spend financial resources on the heads prescribed by the respective authority.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

The institution strictly follows the norms regarding the audit. It completes its internal & external audit within time. The internal audit of the institution is done every year and this audit report is sent to the Joint-Director of Higher Education for further verification. The external audit is also done every year & it is verified by the competent Government authority once in every two –three year. The last audit of the institution is done in July 2014. As for as internal audit is concerned the respective auditor has not made any serious remarks or objections expect some minor irregularities which the institution always tries to overcome.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.

The major funding sources of the institution are the admission and tuition fees from the students, various types of grants from the UGC, the amount of scholarship from the state government. The institution also receives the donation from the academic loving person. If the institution faces some financial problems in the day-to-day administration, the management provides the financial aid.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

a. Has the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)? .6 If 'yes', what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?

Yes, the institution has an active Internal Quality Assurance Cell. It was established in 2005. The cell provides the information to the institution regarding

enhancement of quality of teaching & research of the faculties. During every academic year the cell discusses and guides the faculties and the office members to internalize the quality culture to cope-up with UGCs norms. It also mediates between student and faculties by redressing grievances expressed by the student. Apart from this, the Cell submits the annual reports of the data of performances done by the faculties to the **NAAC, Bengaluru**. In short the cell plays an important role as “**Catalytic agent**” to create academic and research culture in the institution.

- b. How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the management / authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?**

IQAC is one of the most significant body of the institution which looks after the quality & excellences in academic, curricular, Co-curricular matters. The suggestion of IQAC is considered favorable for implementation. The following are the suggestions made by the IQAC implemented by the authorities of the institution.

- 1) The management has started the science stream and the first batch of B.sc in chemistry is passed out in 2013-14.
- 2) The institution has organized an International seminar in the Hindi in the year 2011-12.
- 3) Around 15 Minor Research Project have been sanctioned by the UGC and most of them have been completed and submitted to the UGC.
- 4) One Major Research project has been sanctioned and it is under progress.
- 5) Five Minor and Two Major Research Projects proposals are sent to U. G. C. New Delhi.

IQAC has not external member.

* Energy conservation

As the campus is eco-friendly and the spacious airy with sufficient ventilation having ample sunlight we have a very limited use of electricity. The institute has minimum number of electric appliances such as ac coolers, refrigerators, hence the energy is conserved.

* Use of renewable energy

The institute has no renewable energy system.

* Water harvesting

The college is located on the bank of river Panzara, having adjacent rivulet (Nala) and old well; it helps to maintain natural percolation of the rain water. On account of this the college campus and adjacent region have good ground water level.

* Check dam construction

The institution does not have check dam construction

* Efforts for Carbon neutrality

The following efforts are made to maintain the campus carbon neutral

1. The institute has separate parking area for bikes and motor vehicles. The vehicles are not allowed other than the parking area.
2. Since the majority of the students belong to the weaker section of society most of them use bicycles that automatically help to control carbon emission.
3. Dry leaves are buried instead of burning out
4. The wasted papers are not burnt out they are disposed of.

* Plantation

As the part of policy of the institution to keep the campus environment eco-friendly the tree plantation is initiated with the help of volunteers of NSS, Cadets of NCC & the staff members. In addition to this the institution organizes environment awareness programmers with the help of state forest department on the subject of social forestry.

* Hazardous waste management

Hazardous chemical wastages of science laboratories are drained under the ground broken glassware's of the laboratory are sold out to the scrape vendors.

* e-waste management

We have minimums e-wastages and they are sold out to the vendors.

1. Title of the Practice-

Resource Center for Differently Abled. (Blind)

2. Goal-

The institution noticed the problems and challenges faced by these students and decided to do something for these students to encourage them to bring in to the mainstream education. For this purpose we started this center in collaboration with the North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon. We enroll number of students who are visually disabled.

The aim of this center is to promote, protect and ensure fundamental right of education and provide equal opportunities. The very goal of our institution is to make these students competent to stand firmly in the competitive world by establishing a separate unit with well-equipped resourceful class. The center helps to develop their personality talents and creativity to their fullest potential for bringing them in the normal stream and make them productive citizen of the country.

3. The Context-

The institution observed the challenges faced by these students at the very initial stage of their admissions to the colleges in the city because the colleges are away from each other even they face the problem of acceptance as the students in other colleges. We decided to provide the qualitative education for these students from the city under one roof. So we established this center and many of visually disabled students are beneficiaries of this center.

The institution again noticed the difficulties to seat in the normal atmosphere of the teaching learning process. We established a separate well equipped unit to facilitate them with this process by institution.

4. The Practice-

The institution has established this center especially for the visually disabled students to deal with their specific problems. So we perform the practices as we

provide a well-equipped special resource room with full net connectivity for these students in the college campus. It also provides the facilities like printouts of their study material, talking books, cassettes, CDs, Sign language interpreter, use of special models and software's etc. which can be easily accessible for them. The institution makes available the trainers by providing the facility of training at the reputed institutions those prominently do research on these visually disabled people & students. These trained persons share their knowledge with the students of this center.

The institution again organizes some lectures of the subject teachers of their selected subjects. The subjects are taught in the center by these teachers twice in the month. The institution pays special attention towards these students in relation to admission process, examination and communication with subject teachers. It also creates awareness about their job opportunities.

This center functions smoothly through (1) Computer Lab (2) Audio Book Library (3) Office

- ❖ **Computer Lab** – Well equipped lab with advance computer systems net connectivity loaded with screen reader / talking software.
- ❖ **Audio Book Library** – The center has maintained audio book library including the fields of arts, commerce, law and competitive examinations. These books are used by these students regularly.
- ❖ **Office**- An office is established for keeping all the records of the students record of visitors all activities and financial affairs, etc.

5. Evidence of Success-

There is not any special arrangements in colleges in the city for these students. They hesitate to take admissions. If they have taken admission in any college, they develop inferiority complex while moving among other normal students. Keeping this observation in mind, our college started this center in collaboration with North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon for these students as the social responsibility. The main objective of our center and institution is to remove their inferiority complex and to make them feel normal and independent like other students. We give them admissions charging a very nominal fee of Rs. 100/- only. Along with their regular classes the center in which the subject teachers guide and give counseling them. Moreover we provide them the audio CDs, of their study material prepared by the experts from the institution run at Nasik District. We also encourage them to take participation in various academic social and cultural activities like debating, NSS and the programs under Arts circle of the college. Because of such activities some of the students have become good debators and singers. They feel at home while being in the campus. Our efforts resulted in making them confident, independent like the normal students reflect the success at the certain extent. They have also successfully completed their graduation course.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources required- While running this center we face some problems. They are as follows.

1. The University does not frame the specific syllabus keeping in mind such students. They have to follow the regular syllabus framed by the university which is rather difficult to cope up with for them.

2. The center cannot afford regular trained instructors to instruct them in a better way. Regular attendance of these students is very less.
3. The students have choices of the subjects but they concentrate over only some specific subjects which they feel easy for themselves.
4. They need the scribe / writer for the university exams.

Resources Required-

- ❖ Specific syllabus is required.
- ❖ Trained fulltime faculty is required.
- ❖ Limited choice of the subject.
- ❖ Unavailability of the study material in Braille form.

7. **Notes –**

There are few schools and colleges which are specially run only for differently abled students. But the regular colleges do not have such kind of special centers. In spite of having meager resources we are running this center as a social commitment. We wish that the colleges those have sound resources (Financial & Others) should take initiative in this direction and start such kind of centers with the latest technical know-how. Society on its part, should take care of differently abled people and help them to bring into mainstream with whatever resources it has.

3. The Context-

In this mission the V. W. S. College has committed to create excellence through the way of qualitative education and transform the students into the citizens with social responsibility, qualities of competence, confidence and adoptability to cope-up with the present competitive contexts.

Basically, the college is located in that region of the state, which has been suffered with all sort of backwardness. In spite of that the college, since establishment, has rendered quality educational services to the students of this region. The college has large enrollment of the students belonged to backward communities like S.C., S.T., N.T. & O.B.C.s. It is, however, observed that the students in the region, along with various socio-economic problems have deep apprehensions and a sort of inferiority complex. In the matter of self-expression, self-prove and improvement of quality, competence and confidence on account of there mindset, they are failed to tackle the challenge of various competitive examinations – like Civil Services, Banking, CDSC, RRBs etc. The students in the region have been generally indifferent to appear for the said examinations. Unfortunately adequate and standard teaching, guiding and library facilities are not available for the preparation of there examinations.

The fees for the competitive examination classes run into the city are not affordable for our students. So, we have decided to provide the guidance to these backward students at ‘the free off cost’ and this unique feature of our College and practice.

4. The Practice-

This committee for competitive examinations guidance has practiced to provides –

- Special classes to make students acquainted with the various competitive examinations.
- Special training to improve written and spoken English Skill containing comprehension, grammar and pronunciations.
- Academic ambience with discipline and student friendly activities like group discussion.
- Library and reading hall facilities with state, national dailies & various magazines useful for competitive examinations.
- Counseling facility for confidence building among the students.
- Qualified, experienced and knowledgeable faculties and visiting faculties for the guidance.
- Separate office to maintain the official work and separate lecture hall to the lectures.

5. Evidence of Success-

Since the college has started this practice from the academic year 2013-14, so the practice is in seed form which just sowed. But the student's response was overwhelming. The committee has been practiced entrance examination for the admission to said coaching classes to screening the desirable aspirants. Through this way the committee selected 50 aspirants with maximum space for girl and backward community students. The committee arranged regular guidance lectures after college hours. For three consecutive hours in which guidance is provided. The college has got the results of the efforts, some of the admitted student aspirants have got selected for various jobs in state public departments – like Police, Teachers & Banking etc.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources required-

The college and the committee encountered with problems like –

- Inferior mindset of the region in general and the students in particular.
- Pessimistic approach of the students towards the competitive examinations.
- Language problems of the students those of tribal regions.
- Fear of English language and communication skills among the students.
- Socio-economic backwardness of the students which remain bottleneck problem to sustain their competitiveness alive.
- Lack of technicalities in the preparation practice.
- Lack of independent financial recourses on institutional level.

7. Notes –

The college has seen this practice as the need of the hour other than students' performance in their academics, such practice helps students to improve their personality with positive approach to tackle various kinds of uncertainties that arises in their life. The Committee with this practice are able to observe the students on different perspectives and understands talents, strength and consistency of the students aspirants.

POST-ACCREDITATION INITIATIVES

Vidya Wardhini Sabha was established in 1965 with the objective of imparting higher education to the people of socially and economically backward classes. It started its Arts and Commerce College in 1966. Since then the college has been an instrument for campaigning the higher education among the weaker sections of the society.

The college runs at present three important faculties i.e. Arts, Commerce and Science. It offers **8 courses** on special level in arts, **One** in commerce and **One** in science faculty. However we have got the approval of the Government of Maharashtra to start **5** more courses on special level in the faculty of Science from the academic year 2014-15. There are **6 P.G** courses in Arts faculty i.e. M.A in **Marathi, Political Science, History, English, Hindi & Mass Communication** and One P.G. Course in commerce i.e. **M.Com.**

The College was first accredited by NAAC with B+ grade in 2004. As it was the first cycle of the accreditation of the college, we tried at our best to present before the Peer team. However the recommendations which were pointed out by the Peer team were taken seriously and management took the initiatives in these directions.

During the last five years in particular and ten years from the first accreditation in general, the college has taken remarkable initiatives to develop the quality education of the institution they are -

1. Research -

Research is an essential aspect of higher education in the 21st century. The management and principal of the college always encourage faculties and students to undertake the research projects and activities. It always try to inculcate interest in the research to deal with current issues. As result the research atmosphere is created among the faculties and they are contributing potentially in this field. At present we have **17 Ph. Ds** out of total staff of **35** Granted, **Two** From Non-Granted and **One** from CHB Teacher. We have **16** are research guides who are guiding **62** research students in their respective research subjects. Moreover our College has 10 M. Phil's, 14 NET/ SET qualified teachers in the staff.

10 more teachers are doing their Ph.Ds, **One** Major Research Project and **5** Minor Research projects are under progress while **two** Major and **five** Minor Research proposals have been sent to the U.G.C., New Delhi. So far **16** Minor Research Projects have been completed and submitted to the U.G.C. and large number of research articles have been published by the faculties..

Around **40** books, large number of research articles in Journals and Magazines and number of chapters in the books have been published by the faculties. Moreover almost all the faculties have presented research papers in State, National and International seminars and conferences. The college has also organized one **International Seminar in Hindi** in the year 2012-13 in which eminent personalities of Hindi and other Languages participated **Dr. Kho-Gong Kim** from South Korea was the chief guest to inaugurate the Seminar.

2. Restarting of Science Faculty-

The Science faculty, which was closed due to some financial reasons, has been stated again in 2009. The Science faculty offers one special course at UG level i.e. Chemistry and seven subjects on general level. They are Physics, Electronics, Mathematics, Computer Science, Botany, Zoology & Geography. Now we have got the permission from the Government of Maharashtra for Four more Courses to be taught on special level at UG. They are Physics, Geography, Zoology and Computer Science. We have also developed well equipped laboratories in all subjects of the faculty. We have very good response from the students as the number of students taking admission in Science Faculty and it is continuously increasing every year.

3. Resource Centre for Differently Abled (Blind) –

The college has opened a 'Resource Centre of Differently Abled' student (Blind). Taking into consideration the problems and challenges faced by these students and with the motive to bring them in to the mainstream education, the Centre has proved to be very helpful to create a sort of confidence among such students. The centre provides various facilities to these students for examination, the concession in admission fees, special classes for guidance and counseling, Audio CDS of study material and opportunity to participate in various academic social and cultural activities. Our efforts resulted in making them confident independent like the normal students.

4. New Women's Hostel –

The college has constructed a women's hostel from the grants of Rs. 48,36,000/- received from U.G.C. under XIth plan. The hostel consists of Common room, Wardens room, Reading room, Dining room, Pantry, sick room, Visitors room and 6 bathrooms & 4 W.C. on the ground floor comprising 269.64 sq. mtrs. On the first floor there are 9 Living rooms for female students with six bathrooms & four W.C comprising 269.64 sq. mtrs. The preference is given to the girl's students coming from tribal areas and backward classes. The concession is given in the hostel fees for students of economically weaker sections.

5. Campus Development and Beautification-

The management of the college has concentrated over the security of the campus. So it built the compound wall at the east and south direction of the campus. Along with this the compound wall is built around women's hostel and library also. The wall at the west of the campus is extended by increasing its height. The tree plantation is done in the campus and around 100 trees are planted. The beautifying and eco-friendly campus is developed in the college. Similarly a small Botanical Garden is developed in the library.

6. Digitalization of Library -

The library of the college is digitalized and all the transaction about book issuing for students is computerized. The data of the all books also digitalized.

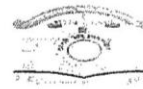

- 2) The lists of various scholarships payable to students were not produced for our verification. Some Scholarships are payable since long time. If they are not payable, the same should be returned to the concerned departments.
- 3) The advances are given to employees of the College and others from time to time. However, the accounts are not settled immediately on completion of the purpose of advance. It is necessary that system should be evolved to ensure that the account of advance is being submitted timely and the entries are passed accordingly.

- 4) The books of account of V.W. Sabha and its branches excluding Sr.College Non-Grant division are yet to be audited and hence we could not verify whether internal transactions between Sr. College and other units have been tallied or not.
- 5) Furniture & Dead Stock register was not produced for our verification. Physical Verification of all assets should be carried out by the management and discrepancies, if any, should be dealt with in the books of account.
- 6) On Assets side under the head 'Advances' the following amounts are shown receivable. Out of this, some amounts are outstanding since very long time which should be recovered or adjusted in the books by making proper entries. For this the approval of the managing committee should be taken.

We have examined the balance sheet as at 31st March 2014 and the Income and Expenditure Account for the year ended on that date attached herewith of V.W.Sabha's Arts, Commerce and Science College (Senior College – Non Grant Unit).

These financial statements are the responsibility of the management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We have conducted the audit in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in India. Those standards require that we plan & perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting Principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

We certify that the balance sheet and the income and expenditure account are in agreements with the books of account maintained at the Head office at Dhule.

Subject to above we report that :-

Remarks :-

- 1) The books of account of V.W. Sabha and its branches are yet to be audited and hence we could not verify whether internal transactions between Non-Grant unit and other units have been tallied or not.
- 2) Signatures of Payees on Salary Sheets should be obtained. In some cases signature were not obtained.
- 3) Advances given are shown in the Balance Sheet under the head "Other Accounts". In most of the cases these are outstanding since long time. The

explanation as to why the advances have not been recouped was not given to us. It is suggested that the account of the advances should be obtained from the concerned persons to settle the accounts. Confirmation letters were not obtained from the concerned persons.

- 4) The lists of GOI Scholarship payable, Caution Money Deposit, Library Deposits and Laboratory Deposit were not produced for our verification.
- 5) Investment in Indira Vikas Patra of Rs.1000 is due for maturity since long time. The same should be encashed. Also, the certificate for IVP was not produced for our verification.
- 6) Physical verification of assets should be carried out and discrepancies, if any, should be dealt with properly in the books of account. Dead Stock register was not produced for our verification.
- 7) The unit has taken Anamat of Rs. 1,25,000/- from various persons in cash for which permission of the Hon. Charity Commissioner obtained, if any, was not produced for our verification.




